Did you know that you can find the atmosphere of the City of Lights just a few steps away from the city center? In nearby towns, there are similar Haussmannian boulevards and neighborhoods that perfectly imitate certain Parisian locations under the camera eye, such as Montmartre or the Paris countryside.

. Haussmannian style

At the end of the 19th century, Napoleon III decided to transform Paris and gave Baron Haussmann the mission to "aerate, unify and beautify" the city.

From 1853 to 1870, Haussmann undertook major public works that reshaped 60% of the city. To open Paris, he designed the wide and airy avenues we still use today. He also planned parks and gardens which, alongside new water and sewer systems, made the city greener and cleaner.

At the same time, Haussmann conceived a modern architectural style that would bear his name and become one of the Parisian symbols *par excellence*.

After filming *Second Chance* with Catherine Deneuve in 1976, Claude Lelouch had some 35mm reel left over. He set himself a challenge: film a sequence shot of a high-speed ride across Paris in his own car, a Mercedes-Benz 450 SEL.

The project resulted in a 7-minute and 52-second short film that became the stuff of legend, with Lelouch reaching over 200 km/h while on Avenue Foch - and is considered to be one of the best car films by many filmmakers.

.Parisian canals

On May 19, 1802, the Ourcq Canal, named after the river, opened and became the first diversion canal in Paris.

It was intended to provide the city with the food and water it needed, and then played a major role during the First World War by enabling the transportation of the wounded and the circulation of goods.

Today the canal has become a place of leisure, made famous by the French film *Amélie* (2001).

.The Countess of Castiglione

Virginia de Castiglione, a highly skilled Italian spy, became the mistress of Napoleon III to gain access to the greatest secrets of French politics.

Her beauty caused a sensation and she became a model for the imperial court photographer, Pierre-Louis Pierson, who took over 500 pictures of his new muse.

This marked the beginning of fashion photography.

. Jimmy Winkfield

Born in 1882 in Kentucky, Jimmy Winkfield, the son of freed slaves, was the first black jockey to win the prestigious Kentucky Derby twice.

Spotted by an oil tycoon, his life then became as glorious as it was tumultuous, and led him first to Russia, then to France in 1918, at the end of a heroic journey. He then moved to Maisons-Laffitte where he married Baroness Lydia de Minckwitz, and mingled with the crowned heads of Europe, Hemingway, Josephine Baker and many others.

. Elsa Schiaparelli

A contemporary of Jeanne Lanvin and Coco Chanel, Elsa Schiaparelli invented sports fashion in Paris. Close to the surrealists, she innovated in terms of materials, fits, and motifs.

Her collections seduced many Hollywood actresses with strong and independent characters: Katharine Hepburn, Lauren Bacall, Mae West...

In 1934, she became the first female fashion designer to make the cover of Time Magazine. And despite numerous opportunities elsewhere, she always remained faithful to her adopted city.




Les Étoiles are part of the remarkable architectural complexes that make up the Paris Region landscape. The architect Renée Gailhoustet imagined this project in the 70s, and brought it to fruition with the help of her colleague Jean Renaudie. This urban complex, an emblematic example of the Brutalist style, was used as a set for the latest saga of *Hunger Games: The Mockingjay, Part 2*.

In 1978, the Château de Vaux-le-Vicomte welcomed the most famous British secret agent, or at least his film double.

Usually located on the set 007 at Pinewood Studios, the film production of the 11th opus of the James Bond series, *Moonraker*, relocated to France thanks to a better tax rebate.





. Domaine de Courances

The Domaine de Courances has a horseshoe-shaped staircase similar to the one at the Château de Fontainebleau. It is indeed an exact copy that was built in 1872 at the request of Baron Samuel de Haber, a wealthy Swiss banker who fell in love with the region.




Another feature?


The statues of the park were designed to counterbalance the effects of perspective: the further they are from the chateau, the larger they become, thus creating a striking optical effect.

. Alice Guy

On March 25, 1895, Alice Guy's life changed. On that day, she attended the world's first film projection by the Lumière brothers in a café in Saint-Germain-des-Prés.

The young woman, who was the secretary of Léon Gaumont, persuaded him to invest in his first short film, which would become the first fiction film in history: *The Fairy of the Cabbages*.
